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AIR is a review about Roman law and Legal history, but also about the studies of any legal systems from Antiquity, Medieval times, or Humanism and even Modern times, related somehow to the History of law. It is a forum for discussion and articles, reviews, announcements, materials. AIR gives an opportunity to young and advanced national and foreign scholars to publish the results of their original research.

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The articles should comply at least MS Office 2003 (or higher version), the font Times New Roman, size 12 (including characters of Latin and Ancient Greek or other ancient language; for the Old Bulgarian – Bukyvede font). The text should align on both sides with line spacing of 1.5. When using ancient language, the author should supply a pdf version of the article.

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The author should write down at the beginning his/her name in the original language of the article, and in a footnote its English version, writing down his/her affiliation and current email address.

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About 150 - 300 words in English.
